## President's Column



As we head into fall, I can look back and be proud of all the accomplishments of the ISRPA. Now that we have opened up the throttle, there is no slowing down! We started the year with an incredible victory at the State House with the passage of Constitutional Carry and had one heck of a party to celebrate. We then went into the National Matches and incorporated true Hoosier Hospitality, as we entertained and fed the best shooters from all over. including the British Pershing Team. Over 100+ years of traditions were carried on at Camp Atterbury and I could not have been prouder of our Association. During these key events and initiatives, ISRPA started developing open Houses for Members and collaborated to offer training opportunities. We are now working to duplicate these efforts around the State.

With our Fall Meeting coming up on November 5th, we are preparing for a *Huge 2023*! We will have a robust legislative agenda, including targeting the cancel culture and the banks and insurance companies that have aided their efforts to exclude those that exercise their constitutionally guaranteed Rights. In April, we will be the host State for the 2023 NRA Annual Convention, which promises to be bigger and more exciting than ever. We will roll right into National Matches in July & August, but will have an *unbelievable* announcement soon for a *World-Class Event* coming to Indiana in September.

A culture of compliance is now enshrined at NRA, and that compliance is and must be foremost in everyone's minds at all times.

These accomplishments have given us a much better understanding of the numerous, diverse and multifaceted things and activities in which NRA engages on a daily basis. And they are also testimony to the resourcefulness of all of NRA's talented workforce.

And let's not forget COVID and its impact on the NRA's operations and our members and our business partners. Despite these things, we have resolutely and successfully soldiered on.

We have weathered and continue to survive and deflect a politically motivated blizzard of attacks from multiple sources designed to weaken and destroy the NRA, to clear the way for those "in the shadows" to pursue their personal designs for some sort of "mob rule" to supplant our Constitutional Republic. Of course, the most prominent of these attacks is the abusive taxpayer-funded effort of NYAG Leticia James to have the NRA dissolved. While other aspects of her complaint against the NRA remain, dissolution - the centerpiece of her complaint - was dismissed; a significant defeat for the spearhead of this effort.

The ruling in NYSR&PA vs. Bruen is an epic achievement in the ongoing saga of the NRA's relentless defense of the Second Amendment and our individual right to keep and bear the private arms of our personal choice. There are an additional 24 court cases at all levels with which NRA-ILA is engaged and Civil Rights Defense Fund cases represent additional pro-gun advocacy in the courts.

There are a number of other things I could mention, but I trust this recap gives you some sense of how well we have done in the face of tremendous adversity. Our successful navigation of these adversities has come with some very significant costs. But there are also some very, very significant expense reductions, which are very favorable to the NRA. To the extent that these costs are tangible, they are reflected in financial statements we will be reviewing today, or will be reflected in future financial statements.

These specific things will be identified as we review the August financial statements. But here is the big picture of the situation: We have incurred a large onetime expense to settle a legal matter earlier this year. This litigation is now behind us.

Contracts we have terminated or renegotiated have reduced expenses, favorably affecting future cash flows and improving our operational surplus.

Digital fundraising is coming on-line for NRA beginning next week.

All insurance renewals are complete. The aggregate cost for the 2022-2023 policy terms is stable and consistent with the 2021-2022 policy terms.

Our investment policy is working and we are riding out the current stock market volatility as well as can be expected. We are well positioned to benefit when the market begins its recovery.

In spite of inflation, the stock market decline, the Russia-Ukraine conflict and other global instability, and the effect of all these things on our members, NRA's most recent mailer did well.

In summary, good things happen when you work hard, do your best to do the right things, have the courage and fortitude to make difficult but necessary choices, accept responsibility and never deviate from the principled path. We have done all of these things, thereby creating the watershed moment I alluded to at the start of my remarks. In my opinion, NRA No. 1, Mark 2 is operational and deployed. And it will be a success.

Only time will tell, but I firmly believe that, similar to the Knight on horseback in the Edgar Allen Poe poem *Eldorado*, the NRA has successfully traveled "over the mountains of the moon, down the valley of the shadow". We must continue to "ride, boldly ride". Improved financial performance – an Eldorado of sorts – will be a reality.

## ISRPA High Power Rifle State Championship Series

Across the Course High Power is traditionally shot over 200 to 600 yards. However, not many ranges can accommodate 600-yard competition, so "reduced course" competitions with visually reduced targets for High Power at 100 to 300 yards are offered throughout the US. The ISRPA High Power State Championship Series consists of three State Championships for Across the Course High Power Rifle: 100 Yard Reduced Course, 300 Yard Reduced course, and the Full Course 600 Yard State Championship. recognize the winner of the aggregate scores from all three as well as a Junior Champion. In 2022, we had a total of 34 shooters that participated in the three matches. Although the State Champion must be a resident of the state, winners of each match are also recognized for the match regardless of residence, extending the competition to neighboring states. The ISRPA State Championship Series consistently draws competitors from surrounding states including Illinois, Ohio, and Kentucky.

The first in the 2022 series was the 300 Reduced Course on August 27, hosted by Wildcat Valley R & P Club. The day started out as a textbook perfect day for a High Power rifle match. Weather was sunny and not too hot, with 25 shooters from across the state, and two from Illinois. Indiana Juniors were well represented, with five attending this match.

Competition was strong throughout the match. At the final stage (600 yard simulated slow fire) Madelyn Schnelle, a 15 year old junior from Crawfordsville dominated the string with a 200-11, and ended with a total score of 791-31 out of a possible 800 to win the match and the 300 yard State Championship. Mark Richard was second with 779-29, and Dave Schnelle was third with 777-33.

## ISRPA 100 Yard Reduced Course State Championship Fall Creek Valley Conservation Club, 10-Sep



Madelyn Schnelle was back to try to defeat last year's winner Mike King of Fort Wayne. The competition was close but Mike prevailed as 100 yard State Champion to defend his title with a 786-20X out of a possible 800. Madelyn Schnelle took 2<sup>nd</sup> place and 1<sup>st</sup> Service Rifle with a 785-24X, and Andrew Beaver took 3<sup>rd</sup> place and 2<sup>nd</sup> service rifle with a 773-21X.

The Full Course State Championship is the Aggregate of both days' matches. Mark Richard was second overall with a 1561-49 for CMP Silver Medal and 1st Master Match Rifle. Mike King finished third overall with a 1560-46 for CMP Bronze Medal and 1st Master Service Rifle.

Special recognition goes to Emma Branson, another female Junior shooter...shooting some of her best scores of the year right at the Master threshold, with a total of 1501-28. In addition, special recognition goes to her Dad, Geoff Branson for "King of the Xs", with a total of 57, the most of any competitor!

The ISRPA Grand Aggregate Trophy recognizes the High Shooter of the aggregate of the 100, 300 and 600 yard High Power State Championships.

## Pershing Trophy International Team Match

The following was written by Jamie Piotrowski (Fishers) reflecting on making the US Pershing Team during the 2022 NRA Smallbore National Championships, fired at Camp Atterbury.

As many of you know, my passion is competitive marksmanship. This year my goal was to earn a spot on the US Pershing Team and I am happy to say that I accomplished my goal!

The Pershing Match is a smallbore prone match that occurs every 8 years between teams representing the US and Great Britain. Both teams shoot the match at the same time and on the same range. This match occurs in the US using US targets but equipment legal under British rules. The brother match is called

the Robert's Match. It typically occurs midway between Pershing Matches and is fired in Britain using international targets. Spots on either team are coveted and a major accomplishment.

The US selection process required me to first make the US Dewar Team by being within the top 20 shooters during the metallic sight phase of the 2022 NRA Conventional Smallbore Prone National Matches (I was 12th). Then my aggregate score from the Dewar and Prone Nationals had to be within the top 10 (I was 9th, with special thanks to my Dewar wind coach and tension-reliever, Cameron Zwart). Of the 10 firing members, seven had accomplishments ranging from being an Olympic athlete, to World Champion, NRA, CMP, and/or ASSA National champion, to being a member of an NCAA National Championship team, to being an NCAA All-American...truly an elite group.

After the Dewar match, the Pershing team was announced, and I received an invitation from the British Team to a formal banquet they hosted. The evening was full of fun and insightful discussions. One of the discussions involved goals and kicked-off some serious introspection, which I believe, will help me to the next level. At one point during the evening of celebration, each member of the GB Team gave a corresponding US Team member a very nice memento/plaque.

The firing of the match was a special experience. The day started with a cannon shot prior to both countries'

national anthem. smoke from the cannon drifted past with near perfect synchronization Star-Spangled the Banner. Then we hung 100-yard targets and got to it. During the 3-minute preparation period, I did my best to settle down and establish a proper natural-point-of-aim. My typical 3/4 X-ring hold was every bit of the 10 ring (about 2-3 times bigger than normal!) due to the adrenalin. This was by far the most match pressure I have ever experienced. On top of this, my trigger failed exactly at the end of the prep' period. Luckily, I

was able to fire a warm-up shot with it and it continued to work throughout the match. Between listening to wind calls from Olympian and team coach, Mr. Bruce Meredith, I focused hard on executing my shot cycle to block-out distractions and keep my shots in the 10 and X rings. Still, I managed to skip a step in my shot process once at the 100 yard to drop a point. Next came the 50-yard stage where I shot well except for one shot that dropped a second point. When both the shooters Bruce was coaching were complete (Stephen Angeli and I), he congratulated us and offered some constructive criticism. Then it was a long wait until the targets were scored and the US team declared the winner by 2 points on a 4,000-point basis. Very close.

## LEGISLATIVE REPORT

By Bill Dowden, Legislative Director

The anti-2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment leaders never give up in their quest to deny lawful Americans their inherent – not government-given – right to keep and bear arms. Despite their assurance that they just want "reasonable laws and rules" to regulate



firearms, their end game is to take away the freedom of every American, except their bodyguards, to own and use firearms. In that attempt to control people's freedoms, they employ such terms as "gun control", "assault rifle", etc., to deceive even gun-owners.

To accomplish the goal of "disarmament" they need to know who owns firearms, but a national registry of firearms owners is banned. The background check required by Federal law when purchasing a firearm from a federal firearms licensee overcomes that ban to some extent, but lawmakers on behalf of law-abiding gun owners have so far resisted the universal background check. Now the "anti's" have come up with another plan. Since most people now use "credit cards" to simplify and speed up a transaction, and each purchase is listed in a Merchant Category Code, such as "merchandise", "home improvement", "restaurants", or "sporting goods", etc., the purchase of a shotgun would be listed under the new category "Guns and Ammunition."

Another issue, which pops up around the state from time to time, is a rule or ordinance infringing upon the 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment. Thankfully, in 2011 Senator Jim Tomes (now an ISRPA and NRA board member) introduced a State Preemption bill, which prohibits municipal units of local government passing ordinances or rules regulating firearms. Despite strong resistance by towns and cities, professional sports, the media, et al, the bill was passed by the General Assembly and signed into law by then-Governor Mitch Daniels. Some units of local government still try to regulate firearms and seem unaware of the State law, and need to be reminded that such actions could cost significant amounts of taxpayer money if they are challenged.

The midterm election for state and federal lawmakers carries great importance for the future of Indiana and the Nation. Lawful Hoosier gun-owners need to know where the candidates will really stand on the individual's right to keep and bear arms if elected.

As we have often been reminded: Freedom Isn't Free. The questions is: Are we willing to pay the price as the Founding Fathers and many did later?



## **Olympic Vision**

Since 2018, The X Count has been a Certified Training Center for USA Shooting. As in past years, 2022 saw appearances by US and international Olympians for various events hosted at The X Count. During Elite Camp this July, five-time Olympian from Serbia, Nemanja Mirosavljev, visited The X Count and worked with NCAA coaches to instruct some of the top juniors from around the nation.

This year, The X Count's Olympic vision was expanded to ISSF (International Shooting Sport Federation) events. The X Count staff attend two World Cups and a Grand Prix. In June, both Gregg and Diane Rice attended the ISSF World Cup in Chateauroux, France with Team USA. Coach Gregg Rice worked directly with the athletes. The X Count's executive director, Diane Rice, utilized the trip to collaborate with facilities representatives and an architect from the Fort Wayne design build firm, CME. CME was present as part of the exploration process for Indiana's own world cup facility. The site in France will likely be the location of the 2024 Paris

Olympic shooting events.

In August, The X Count staff was in opposite hemispheres on continents where they had never been. Diane attended the World Cup in Changwon, South Korea. Diane was loader and team lead as Team USA rifle shooter, Madison Champion, earned her minimum qualifying score for the world championships in November.

Meanwhile, Gregg was coaching with Team USA at the Grand Prix in Arequipa, Peru. Since France, Gregg had been working closely with rifle athlete Jazmin Almlie. Jazmin swept her disciplines at the Grand Prix in Peru bringing home three gold medals. Team USA brought home a total of 16 medals from the event.

The Olympic vision is international comradery. The X Count has brought people from all over the world to train, compete, and instruct to Indiana. As of this summer, The X Count staff has now taken the Midwest culture around the world to many continents and countries participating in friendly competition with athletes from around the world. Many of those athletes will someday come to Indiana to compete as Indiana continues its journey to become the shooting sports mecca for the US.
