
Celebrating Excellence: Highlights from the 60th ISRPA Tom Lorenzen Memorial Junior State Rifle and Pistol Championships

Empowering Novice Shooters: A Review of Condition Red Response's Basic Handgun Safety Course

а seasoned shooter As reflecting on the experience of those just starting their journey with firearms, I had the privilege of attending Condition Red Response's Basic Handgun Safety Course—a program foundational tailored for individuals with little to no prior experience. This course, designed to ease initial anxieties and instill confidence in novice shooters. exceeded expectations in its comprehensive approach and thoughtful instruction.

From the outset, it was evident that the instructors were dedicated to providing a nurturing and supportive environment for all participants. Their professionalism and genuine concern for each student's comfort and understanding set the tone for an enriching learning experience.

One of the course's standout features was its inclusivity, catering to a diverse range of participants spanning from young teenage girls to women in their sixties. This demographic diversity underscored the universal appeal of firearms education and the importance of making it accessible to all who wish to learn.

Throughout the course, the instructors covered essential topics pertinent to beginners, starting with an overview of range etiquette and what to expect when visiting a range—a crucial aspect often overlooked, The instructors emphasized the importance of discernment when receiving advice on the range, highlighting the need to exercise caution and critical thinking, especially as one gains more experience and may be inclined to give unsolicited advice.

The exploration of different firearms, including their disadvantages, advantages, calibers, styles, and actions, provided invaluable insights for participants in selecting the right firearm for their needs and preferences. Moreover, instructors addressed practical concerns such as overcoming initial anxieties and accommodating physical limitations, particularly for elderly participants dealing with arthritis—an aspect of firearm selection.

The course's emphasis on firearm safety was commendable, with a focus on preventing unintended injuries, safe home storage options, and responsible firearm ownership. By prioritizing these foundational principles, participants left with a solid understanding of how to handle firearms safely and responsibly.

In a departure from traditional introductory courses that may overwhelm students with technical details. Condition Red Response's Basic Handgun Safety Course streamlined learning the process focusing on practical concepts essential for safe handling. eschewing exhaustive Bv discussions on historic pistol parts in favor of hands-on instruction and relevant safety protocols, the course ensured that participants left with a tangible foundation which to build their skills.

Moreover, the opportunity to shoot live .22LR rounds at the end of class provided a handson culmination to the learning experience, reinforcing key safety principles while offering participants a chance to apply what they had learned under controlled conditions.

In conclusion, Condition Red Response's Basic Handgun Safety Course is a shining example of effective firearms education tailored for beginners. With its thoughtful instruction, inclusive approach, and emphasis on practical safety principles, this course equips participants with the confidence and knowledge needed to navigate their firearms journey safely and responsibly. I wholeheartedly recommend it to anyone looking to embark on their firearms education journey with a solid foundation and supportive guidance.

NRA Multitasks with Big Changes and BIGGER Impacts

By now everyone knows that the NRA is searching for a new leader. The leading Civil Rights organization in the Country has instituted a well thought out process to identify, recruit, and select a new EVP/CEO.

A special NRA Search Committee has been formed and has begun accepting nominations for consideration. The Committee has met several times and has been working diligently to propose a process identification. settina of qualifications & expectations, incorporating Board/ and Staff input for the position candidates. It will be a monumental effort by this Committee to accomplish this task by the May Annual Meeting, as required by the Bylaws; we will keep you posted on the progress.

The NRA has recruited many new Board Members, who with the other seasoned Board Members have been charged with and empowered to bring the NRA to the highest levels of ethics and standards that our members deserve. All voting members will have the opportunity this month to vote for a third of the Board, as well as several Bylaw changes proposed by the Board as follows:

Reporting requirements for all Directors, Officers, or employees of the NRA who are also members who has any interest or involvement in another entity that receives payment for goods or services in excess of \$2000 within a year must file a written statement to the Secretary of the NRA, which shall be transmitted to the entire board of Directors.

A Chief Compliance Officer has been added as an officer of the NRA. The compliance officer is elected by and directly reports to the Board of Directors and cannot be fired by the EVP. The Board cannot eliminate the office of compliance without the consent of the full membership.

The Board of Directors now has its own counsel to provide advice and legal analysis to assist the Board in its duties and to make sure that there is absolute transparency between the Board and NRA staff & Officers.

Ballots must be received by April 30th...DON'T FORGET TO VOTE!!!

Although the NRA is under weaponized sieae from government entities and the liberal anti-freedom machine, the organization is holding its own and is on the verge of turning the tables in the war against The American Way. We will be seeing a HUGE Supreme Court Decision this summer that will expose corrupt government entities that have been weaponized against NRA, maior the Conservative organizations, and individuals.
